Sister State Men Named Officers

One Louisianian and three Mississippians were among 137 reserve officers whose appointment as second lieutenants in the regular army was announced Saturday by the war department.

Named were Joseph Cummins Richard, Baton Rouge, assigned to Fort Jackson, S. C.; William Franklin Lahatte, Vicksburg, assigned to Alaska defense; Robert Wiygul Burns, Ecu, Miss., assigned to Panama canal, and Grover Cleveland Brown, Payette, Miss., assigned to Barksdale Field, Shreveport.

One hundred of the appointees were selected from 1000 candidates appointed previously in the reserve to one year of active duty under the Thomason act. The act provides for the appointment in the regular army of not less than 10 per cent of the candidates.

The remaining 37 officers were chosen from a group of reserve officers on active duty with the Air Corps.

PEACHES DESTROYING GEORGIA'S FISH LIFE

Atlanta, July 5.—Georgia peaches were blamed today with the death of numerous fish.

The director of wildlife, Zack D. Cravey, said the situation had become so serious that he issued an appeal to packers, growers and shippers not to dump surplus and defective peaches into the streams. Cravey said peaches killed the fish in two ways—the fruit itself acts as a poison and the decaying peaches create an acid that also is poison to fish life.
